AMI INSTALLATION PROJECT UPDATE

You may have recently come home to find your clocks blinking or maybe you've noticed a new piece of equipment hanging from the utility poles. Wheat Belt's technology department has

been busy deploying an updated advanced metering infrastructure (AMI). The new system features many tools and enhancements such as daily and on-demand electrical reads, on-demand voltage readings and interval kWh data. The system also provides tools to help us quickly identify outages and other potential issues. It utilizes RF technology and given the exciting nature of electrical metering you may be inclined to think that RF stands for "Really Fun". It actually stands for Radio Frequency, as the new meters utilize radio waves to send and receive data.

Besides replacing the 5,000+ active meters, several hundred routers and ten collectors are also being installed across our service area. The routers are the white rectangular pieces of equipment hanging from transformer poles throughout the system. These routers work with the meters to help transmit data back to the collectors. From the collector the data is securely sent to the system software where it can be retrieved from our office or through other connected devices.

With over 3,900 meters installed we are entering the home stretch of the AMI deployment. The installation *Continued on 12-C*

POLE TOP RESCUE TRAINING



Pole Top and Bucket Rescue Training is mandated for each lineman every year. This training is critical because of the nature of our industry. They need to practice and have a plan so if something would happen, they will know what needs to be done and how to proceed for their and the injured person's safety.



During our August Safety Meeting, Wheat Belt linemen participated in the training. Each lineman with full gear, approximately 20 lbs., is required to climb a pole and rescue an injured "lineman". A 160 pound mannequin is used during training. They must secure and safely lower it from the pole top to the ground within four minutes. Linemen also train on the procedure to rescue an injured lineman from an extended bucket truck. The training was conducted by NREA Job Training & Safety Instructor, Scot Ouderkirk and Larry Oetken.

HOTLINE SCHOOL



Wheat Belt hosted the annual NREA Hotline School, August 31 - September 2, at the Don Winkelman Training Field located north of Sidney. The school is open to linemen from municipal and rural utility providers. Larry Oetken, of Norfolk, is the JT&S Coordinator.

There were a total of 52 participants. The training included hands-on field work as well as inside class sessions that provided information on high voltage installation, adjustment of switches, and training on regulators and reclosers.
